ANDREA



Andrea arrived to Casa Central's School Age Program (SAP) after her father gained custody of her and came to him with absolutely nothing but a backpack. The program was able to provide Andrea with essentials such as clothes and bedding through our partners like Cradles to Crayons and Casa Central's Holiday Magic Program. At first, Andrea was quiet and reserved and did not really engage with her peers. Several months into the program, Andrea is able to express herself, and has fostered her talents, and has built relationships with her teachers. We are so happy that Andrea found her voice, so much so, that she performed a solo at a talent show in the beginning of the year! We can't wait to see what Andrea does next!

Our School Age Program (SAP) is a year-round out-of-school-time program where children and youth can enhance their academic, social, and personal skills in a recreational environment. The School Age Program provides a comfortable, safe, fun place for children and youth to unwind, play, practice skills, and interact with caring adults. Our participants also have access to our computer labs to work on homework and play educational games as part of SAP's regular programming. Program staff provide supervision to the children, help with their homework, and address questions related to computer usage.

The School Age Program also provides education in the areas of socio-emotional development, health and nutrition. During the summertime and other school breaks, our School Age Program is open for full-day programming and special activities.

MELISSA



After learning about Casa Central's Violence Prevention and Intervention (VPI) program, Melissa came forward and sought assistance to develop a safety plan to leave the abusive relationship she had been in for 10 years. While working with her Casa Central VPI caseworker, Melissa became informed of her rights and empowered to decide what she wanted to do about her relationship, and what steps she needed to take prior to leaving the abusive relationship. Melissa worked with her community, friends, and family as she developed her safety plan and is optimistic that a brighter future is waiting for her. We applaud Melissa's perseverance, resilience, and willingness to trust Casa Central's VPI caseworker as part of her support circle.

Whether violence is seen, heard or experienced directly, it can impact the health and well-being of individuals, families, and communities.

Since 1987, Casa Central's
Violence Prevention & Intervention Program
has worked to help families and
young children heal from the trauma of
violence and disrupt the cycle of a
potential life of violence in the future. Casa
Central's Violence Prevention
& Intervention Program provides services to
children, adults, seniors, and
families who have been impacted by domestic
violence, sexual abuse, community violence,
and other traumas. Services are free of charge
and are available in both English and Spanish.

DIANA



Diana and her three children became homeless after Diana made the decision to separate from a violent partner. The family struggled to find a stable living situation, bouncing from friend to friend and shelter to shelter, before being referred to Casa Central's La Posada program.

With the support of La Posada staff and the program's wide range of community partners, Diana was able to begin divorce proceedings, enroll in a program to complete her Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice, and secure employment. While staying at La Posada, Diana was also able to save more than \$1,000 to support her and her family as they transitioned to permanent housing.

Ultimately, after exploring her options with the support of the La Posada team, Diana chose to move to Aurora, Colorado, where she and her children are happily enjoying their own apartment and wonderful new adventures. Diana shares that La Posada staff provided her with the support she needed to achieve this milestone and become independent.

La Posada's main goal is to restore families who are experiencing homelessness to stable and permanent living situations by providing transitional housing. In addition to housing, La Posada provides case management and wrap-around support services to identify each family's strengths and needs, working to address the root causes of homelessness and preventing recurrence.

LUCIA



Shortly after the onset of the pandemic, Lucia struggled with a disruption to her routine, which included putting a pause on her daily attendance at Casa Central's Adult Wellness Center (AWC). Lucia began experiencing isolation, insomnia, and anxiety. To help her cope with these feelings, her granddaughter and Casa Central staff connected her with an AWC staff member to receive daily check-in calls as she waited to be assigned a Casa Central Home Care Aide. During this time, her AWC staff member sent Lucia motivational text messages and engaged her virtually in activities such as reading 'las noticias del dia', playing dominoes or 'loteria', performing light exercises, and completing arts and crafts projects. Lucia now has a new and much healthier routine with the support and daily visits from her Casa Central Home Care Aide.

Since 1982, Casa Central's Home Care Services program has been providing bilingual and culturally responsive in-home services to Latino and other older adults in the Chicagoland area.

Casa Central's accredited Home Care Services program provides compassionate and reliable in-home care so that older adults can remain safe and independent as they age. Casa Central's Home Care Services day-to-day caregiving provides assistance with a variety of daily living tasks. By helping with meals, mobility, and personal care, Home Care Services strives to support each participant's independence and improve their quality of life.

Casa Central's accredited Adult Wellness
Center (AWC) offers daily center-based care to
Latino and other older adults, 60 years of age
and older, and provides a wide variety of fun
and therapeutic activities that help older adults
maintain, improve, and/or restore their
emotional, cognitive, and physical well-being.
Our Adult Wellness Center offers unique
bilingual and bicultural services within a safe
and supervised setting.

2020 KICK-OFF RECEPTION

NAVIGATING REMOTE LEARNING

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, children from our Early Learning Academy program remained sheltered-in-place from March through June and were connected to Casa Central Teachers, Parent Educators, and Family Development Specialists by using web-based resources to continue learning at home! Teachers set daily themes, which included Backward Day, Sports Day, and Superhero Day. Children loved having the chance to dress up and to see their friends also participating which helped them feel connected to the classroom community!




HOW FUNDS ARE USED

CASA CENTRAL'S STORY

THE BEGINNING



Called to meet the needs of newly arrived immigrants, a group of Hispanic pastors rented a storefront in the heart of a predominantly Hispanic neighborhood. They called this center Casa Central Evangelica and began providing counseling and aid to those in need. As their scope and services expanded, the agency became known simply as Casa Central.

EARLY LEARNING ACADEMY



The Early Learning Academy (back then known as Casa Infantil) was officially licensed to serve 40 children. During these past 44 years, ELA has continued to grow and provide high quality early learning services to the community through both center-based and home-based options.

HOME CARE SERVICES



Home Care Services was initially referred to as the Chore and Housekeeping program, and began by offering home-based care to 9 older adults. Today, this program serves more than 800 older adults in their homes throughout the greater Chicagoland area every year.
